graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University in Delaware, Ohio with a degree in sociology.






Jessica Brens Administrative Assistant – Manhattan

Aside from my professional pursuits, I enjoy swimming, biking, and running. This past summer I completed my first Ironman, right here in NYC.







A LOCAL'S GUIDE - CHELSEA

HIGH LINE: A lot can be written about what has become Chelsea's number one attraction. An old elevated railroad that shuttered in 1980 and was slated for removal in the late 90s now snakes through over 350 galleries and a collection of restaurants and retailers from the Meatpacking District to West 30th Street between Tenth and Eleventh Avenues. BILLY'S BAKERY: They have my picture on the door since I have been known to wipe this place clean of frosting. One generally does not have to fight the hordes of tourist a la Magnolia Bakery to enjoy baked goods that are arguably better. (184 Ninth Avenue, billysbakerynyc.com)

TIA POL/EL QUINTO PINO: Original Basque tapas found in this tiny nook on Tenth Avenue. The wife's personal favorite and surprisingly easy on the wallet. For an even smaller less conspicuous spot, try El Quinto Pino on West 24th. Literally just a marble bar, about 12 barstools and a server slinging small dishes. (Tia Pol – 205 Tenth Avenue, tiapol.com El Quinto Pino – 401 West 24th Street, elquintopinonyc.com)

STELLA'S PIZZA: I think it's the garlic in the sauce that makes it just right. For a while the guys running this place thought I lived upstairs since I was there so often. It wasn't until they delivered to my apartment that the workers realized that I didn't live upstairs and that I had an existence outside the hours of 2-4am. (110 Ninth Avenue, no website)

ROCKING HORSE CAFÉ: Don't order margaritas from this place and expect to go to work the next day. Great Mexican food and always a lively atmosphere. Sidewalk seating provides the best theater for Chelsea people watching. (182 Eighth Avenue, rocknghorsecafe.com)

CHELSEA MARKET: I could write a whole "Local's Guide" just about Chelsea Market because there's an afternoon's worth of activities to do there. The Chelsea Wine Vault was the original retailer in Chelsea Market and initially only wanted the cellar to warehouse one of the largest private wine collections in New York

City. Developer Irwin Cohen said he would only make the deal if they took out a store front as well. The rest is history with Chelsea Market becoming the neighborhood's retail center and the Wine Vault which is the most comprehensive and non-pretentious place to buy wine on the west side. Also recommended in Chelsea Market are the Lobster Shop, Artisen Cheese Place, Amy's Bread and The Tippler, a speakeasy style bar that can be accessed only from West 15th Street. A LOCAL'S GUIDE -WOODLAWN, THE BRONX AKA "LITTLE IRELAND"

THE HERITAGE – A great bar restaurant for any meal, and a night out. The full Irish Breakfast is a must, but if you go for dinner, indulge in the brown bread and order a burger, along with a pint of Guinness or a bottle of Magners. Top the meal off with either the fried Snickers or the Cadbury crunchy cheese cake. It's a great spot with friendly people, delicious food, and live music. Sunday evenings are a must for a good old traditional seisiun with Jameson's Revenge, one of the best Trad-Irish bands in New York! And if you find yourself in Woodlawn on a Thursday night, be sure to stop in for "Trivia Night" hosted by Massey Knakal's very own Dan Doherty! (960 McLean Avenue, heritagebarandrestaurant.com)

J.P. CLARKE'S SALOON — A great bar to enjoy an evening out, especially in the outdoor beer garden, or to watch a sporting event. Since 90% of the population in Woodlawn is actually from Ireland, every single bar in the neighborhood shows the Irish sports of Gaelic football and hurling, as well as soccer games, but it's also a good spot to watch some American football and baseball. If you're looking for a cultural experience, pop into any one of the bars on McLean Avenue (and Katonah Avenue) to watch a Gaelic or hurling game. It's fun to see everyone sporting their county jersey! (947 McLean Avenue, no website)

VAN CORTLANDT PARK & GAELIC PARK – Woodlawn is separated from Riverdale by Van Cortlandt Park, the fourth largest park in New York City. The park features tennis courts, sports fields, a golf course, basketball courts, a swimming pool, fishing, and hiking and biking trails. Gaelic Park is actually in Riverdale, but is the home to the New York Gaelic Athletic Association, which hosts Gaelic football and hurling games. The best time to go to Gaelic Park is for the Connacht Senior Championship in early May, when one of the county teams from the West of Ireland comes out to play the New York team. Nearly 3,000 spectators come out to enjoy the game, music, and the bar scene. It's definitely worth it! (Gaelic Park: West 240th Street and Broadway, nycgovparks.org/parks/vancourtlandtpark)




ANGELICA'S BAKERY – It has the best Irish scones in town. They are more like a dessert scone, and are baked fresh daily. If you like soda bread, then you must try these scones. They are best toasted, with butter! (4315 Katonah Ave, no website)

THE RAMBLING HOUSE AND RORY DOLANS – Two great bars that are go-to spots after a Yankees game, or any sports game. These bars get packed with New York fans in their gear ready to celebrate the night away. They also have great live entertainment, and are especially packed when the local favorite, Shillelagh Law, comes to play. Rory Dolans also hosts many outdoor neighborhood BBQs and festivals in their beer garden. The Rambling House hosts Sunday seisiuns as well. 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A LOCAL'S GUIDE - UPPER WEST SIDE

79TH STREET BOAT BASIN — Although incredibly packed on Friday and Saturday night, any other time this is my favorite spot to relax by the river. Between stunning sunsets, beautiful boats and an almost decent burger, this is a perfect place for a quick bite to eat or a glass of wine by the water. Expect at least a 30 minute wait on the weekends... but worth it. (Riverside Park and West 79th Street, boatbasincafe.com)

BROTHER JIMMY'S BBQ — This is unquestionably my favorite BBQ spot on the UWS. On Monday nights they have an All-You-Can-Eat Wings, Rib Tips and Bud Draft for \$16 that can't be beat. I asked my wife to become my girlfriend nearly ten years ago at this spot over one of their famous "fish bowls"... essentially a bunch of different liquors, 50 straws and a plastic alligator filled with grenadine in a fish bowl. They also have great live music... occasionally our very own Cameron Mitchell plays a gig there. (428 Amsterdam Avenue, brotherjimmys.com)

WINE AND ROSES — My favorite date spot — this is a tiny wine bar with simply incredible small plates. The music is ambient and romantic and the staff is attentive without being intrusive. Order the filet mignon flatbread pizza or the truffle mac and cheese and explore their wine list. While I don't quite have the palette to truly appreciate it, they received the Wine Spectator "Award of Excellence" for 2007 — 2011. (286 Columbus Avenue, wineandrosesnyc.com)

CENTRAL PARK RESERVOIR — You can find me running here at least three days a week. The 1.58 mile loop is a perfect escape from the hustle and bustle of Manhattan. At any time of day, the views of Fifth Avenue, Central Park West, and Midtown Manhattan are simply amazing. I have seen dozens of celebrities run here over the years including Christopher Walken just a few weeks ago... walking slowly. (centralparknyc.org)

CHILDREN'S MUSEUM OF MANHATTAN — Because I don't have any kids yet, I was always stumped at what to do with my niece and nephew when they are in town, and then I found the Children's Museum. This surprisingly large space is filled with fun



ostensibly educational exhibits for kids that they can climb on, crawl in, push, pull, hit, twist, and bring to life. Also packed with children from all over the city, this is the ideal place to turn your little ones' frowns upside down. (212 West 83rd Street, cmon.org)













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















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SPOTLIGHT ON

You're an accomplished saxophone player. When did you start paying? What was your proudest performance/ accomplishment as a musician?
